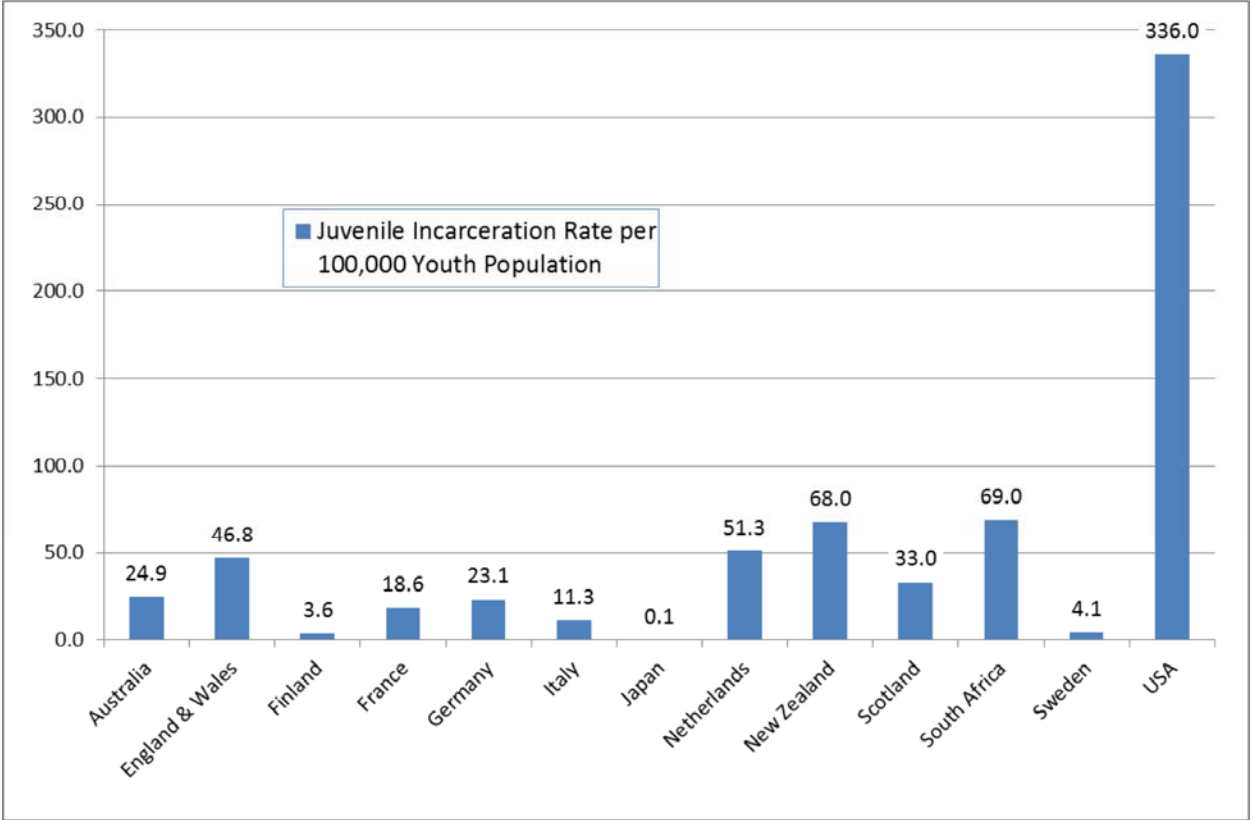
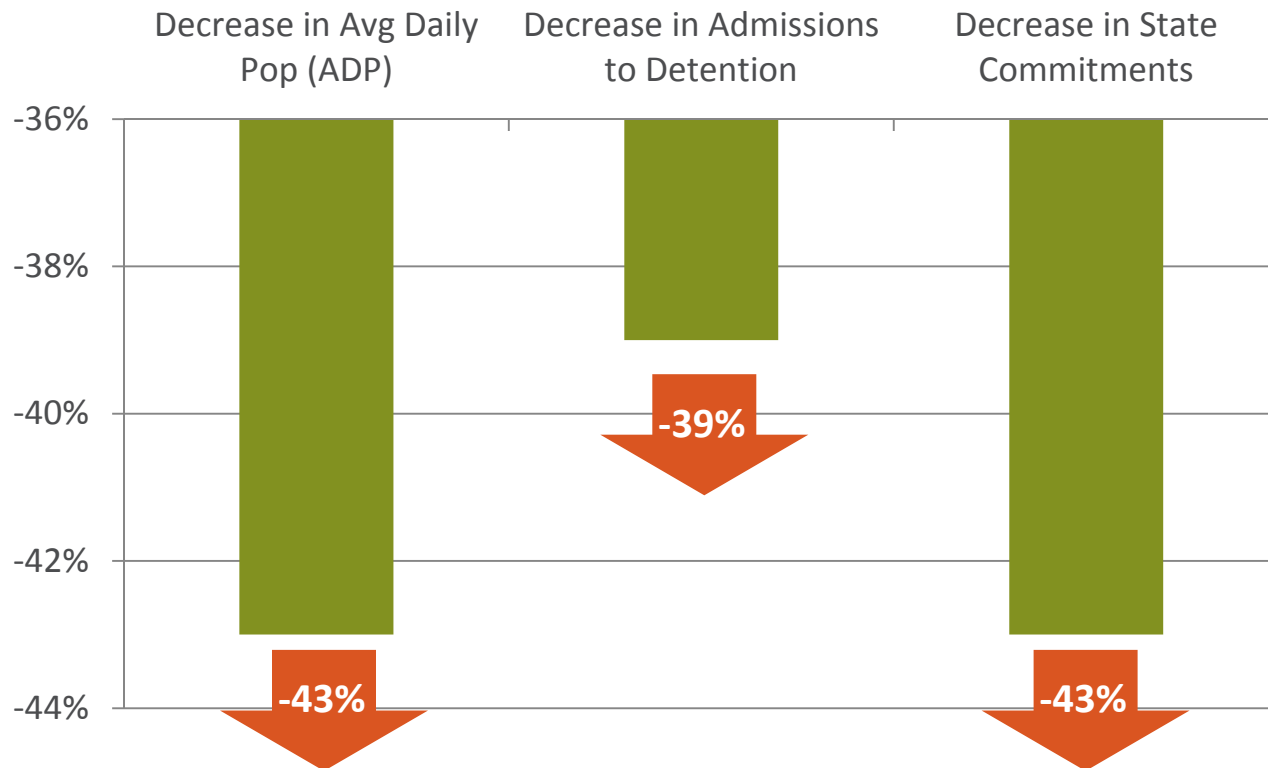

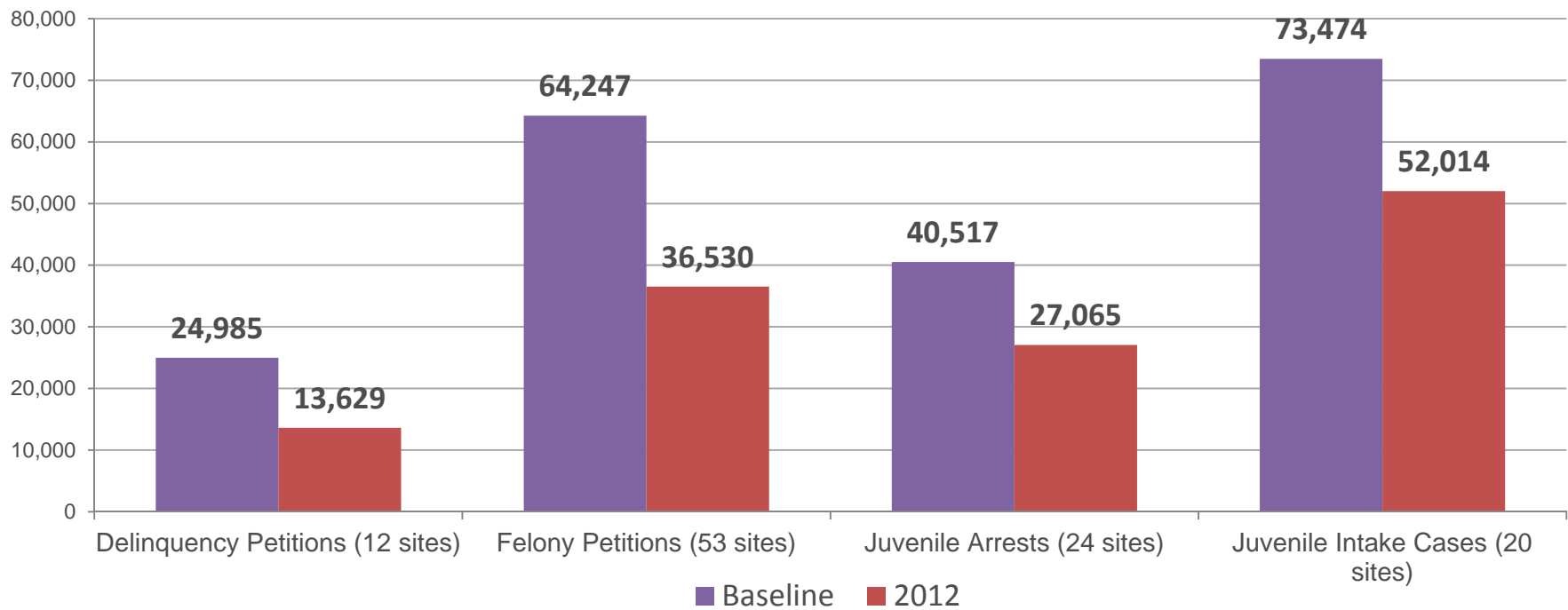


## Changes in the Use of Confinement Across All JDAI Sites Baseline vs. 2012

*N=38 grantees, comprising 112 sites*



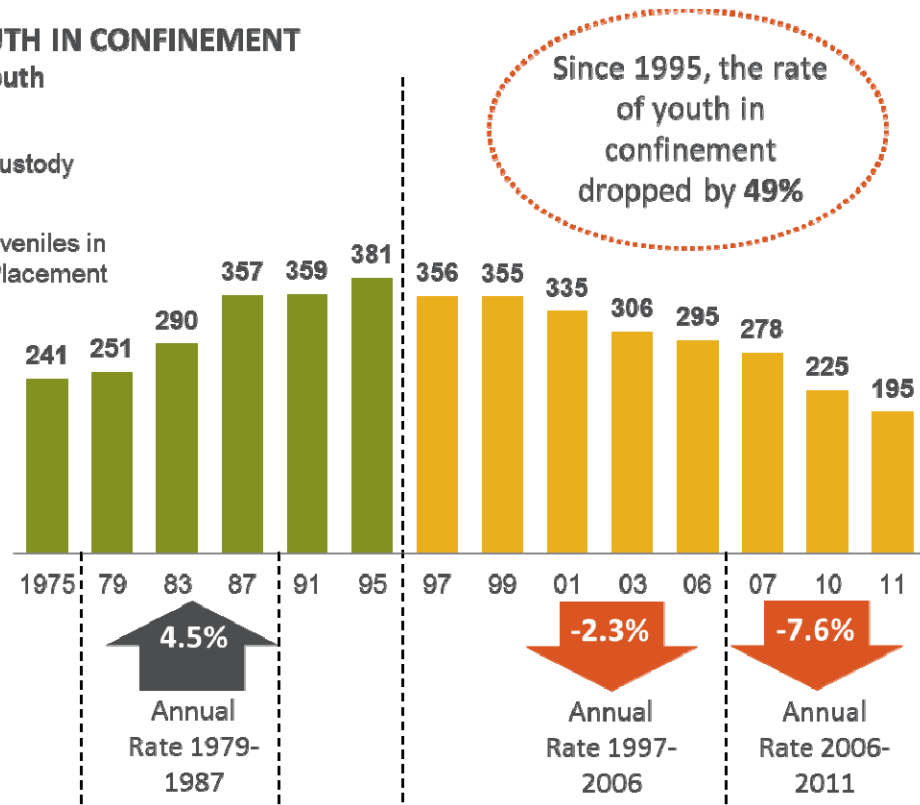
**Aggregate Reductions in Juvenile Crime Indicator Type**

*N=109 sites*



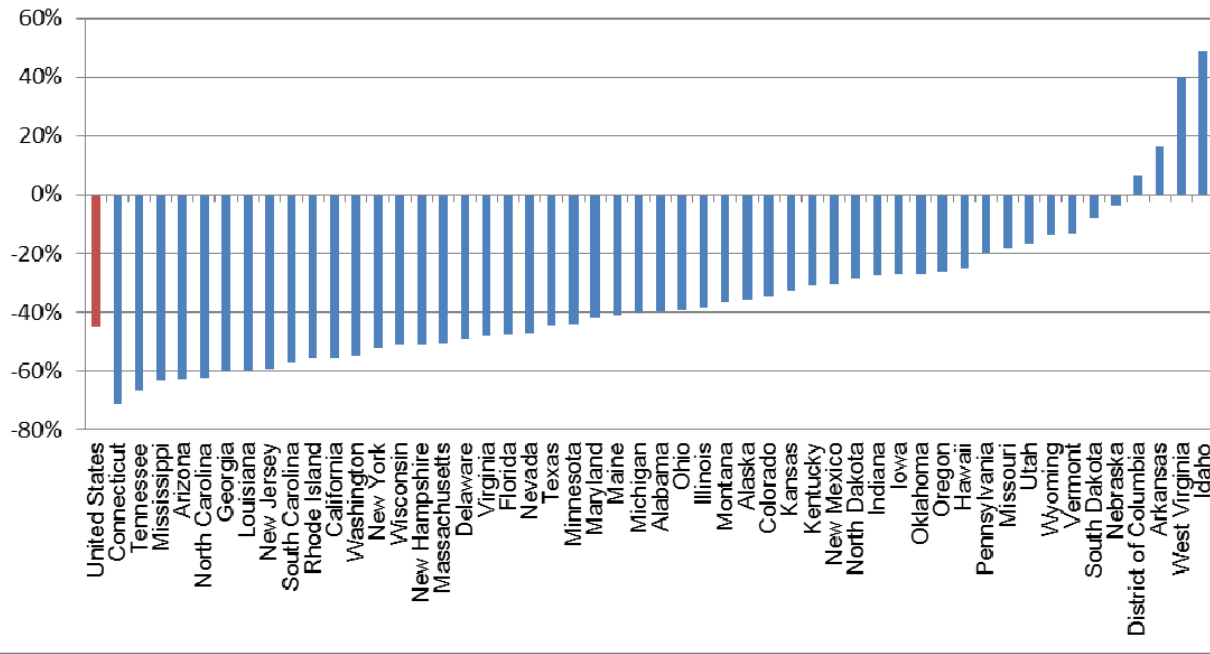
- **45%** fewer Delinquency Petitions

**IN 2011,** confined youth was locked up for a violent crime  
**ONLY 1 OF** index offense (homicide, aggravated assault,  
**EVERY 4** robbery, or sexual assault).

**AND DETENTIONS ARE DUE TO**  
technical violations of probation,  
drug possession, low-level  
property offenses, public order  
offenses, and status offenses.
