

Construction Law is a complex area of law that is practiced in every size of firm and at every level of government. The practice of construction law requires familiarity with federal, state, and local regulations regarding the erecting of buildings. This may include familiarizing yourself with environmental law, insurance law, disability law, employment law, and zoning/land use law, among other areas. Construction lawyers write contracts for buildings, resolve disputes, procure building permits, work to resolve safety issues, help write bids for construction projects, and ensure regulatory compliance. They may work with owners, general contractors, architects, engineers, and urban planners. Special skills that construction lawyers may need in addition to legal skills often include the ability to read building plans and GIS maps.
