**Intellectual property** involves the protection, use, licensing, and sale of intangible creations of an individual's mind. Types of intellectual property that are protected include patents, copyrights, trademarks, trade dress and service marks, moral rights, trade secrets, and the right to be protected from unfair competition. These rights protect inventors, music composers, performers, artists, designers, authors and other writers, licensees and users of intellectual property, and businesses as well. Intellectual property rights cover a very broad category of items. Anything that can be created in the mind, whether it has or is given physical form, can be protected by, and licensed and used as, intellectual property.

Intellectual property is primarily a transactional practice area. Practice before the Patent Office (patent registration and related issues, called "patent prosecution") requires an undergraduate science or engineering background and a separate bar examination. Because much intellectual property practice is similar to and is connected with practice in corporate, other intangible, and tangible personal property, business law coursework and experience is very helpful. Intellectual property litigation involves a combination of intellectual property law and civil litigation knowledge and experience.
