

**International Law** can be divided into two branches: public international law and private international law. Public international law broadly deals with the legal interactions between and among countries. This can include laws or agreements on international trade, criminal laws (extradition), the environment, human rights, etc. Organizations involved in public international law include the United Nations, the International Court of Justice, and the International Criminal Court. Private international law deals with the relationships between individuals or organizations, often in a business setting. This may involve, for instance, coming to an agreement on a shared set of rules to govern a contract.

The field of international law is vast. Attorneys practice in many different settings in both the public and private sectors. For instance, the UN employs lawyers in its Office of Legal Affairs. Government attorneys play a part in drafting international treaties and agreements that govern relationships between countries. Private sector international attorneys are often involved in international business transactions. Typical duties may include drafting contracts, researching international rules and customary law, and representing companies with a global presence in litigation, arbitration, and mediation.
